






Mac Robotics Update

Macdonald high school is participating this year in the **CRC Robotics** competition between various High Schools and Cegeps in the Montreal area. The purpose of the competition is to promote interest and skills in science and technology and to develop a sense of responsibility, communication, achievement and school spirit amongst students. A truly cross-curricular project, our involvement includes instruction on various aspects of working with technology, as well as the planning and construction of a robot designed to complete a given challenge. It also involves the creation of a Journal, Video, Website and display kiosk, each with the aim of promoting the school, describing its involvement in the competition and the robot itself in a bilingual format.

The twenty participating students have put their new skills in using tools, welding, electronics planning, design, construction and working together as a team to good use. They have finished the construction of their display Kiosk which was proudly put on display at the school open house in December. They have finished their design prototypes for the competition robot and are currently in production mode to finalize construction and work out any kinks before the competition on February 21-23. They already have good reason to be proud of their accomplishments, working on their project from 8-20 hours a week and will have even more reason to do so in the weeks to come.





There is a significant cost for this activity (likely \$7000-\$9000). Some of this has been provided by the school and other means, but **they need your help** and sponsorship by means of money, equipment, or any other assistance you can offer them in order to be successful. Any assistance, no matter how small is very much appreciated and will help the students to complete their goal of learning new professional skills and increasing the confidence and motivation not only of the robotics team but the school as a whole.


